CONDITIONAL SENTENCES

1st TYPE (PROBABLE CONDITIONALS)

If Present Simple, Present Simple: If it rains, you get wet.(or conditional zero)

If Present Simple, Future Simple: If you study, you will pass.

If Present Simple, Imperative: If you see him, give him this.

If you are ill, you must go to the doctor./ If you want, you can do it.

*UNLESS (a no ser que, a menos que) can be used instead of a negative sentence (it's the same as "if not"): Unless we hurry up, we'll miss the train. (=if we don't hurry up, we'll miss the train)

If I could go, I would go/ If I **were** you, I would do it.
